Tragedy or Triumph?



hen Morris Power was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer on January 22, 2016, it was a turning point in his life. He had retired on May 31, 2013, having served for 32 years with the Provincial Corrections Services. He rose to the rank of Assistant Superintendent and his last appointment was in charge of the Bishop's Falls Correctional Center. His wife Kelly, who shared his professional career, succeeded him at this facility.

Up to this time, Morris was a strong healthy man, who loved life, enjoyed the outdoors, and particularly looked forward to spending time with his 5 beloved dogs. It was a complete shock for Morris and Kelly to hear such devastating news. The doctors predicted that he had between six months to two years to live. Once the initial shock had registered in his mind, Morris said "There's nothing we can do about it. I'm not going to let it steal my joy. I'm going to live my life the best way I can." He decided to take a positive approach to his diagnosis. He purposed that he would 'get ready'. And that's exactly what happened.

He later wrote "Many things went through my mind in a short period of time. I soon realized that I had an opportunity that many are not fortunate to share. I really can 'get ready'. I can also prepare to make sure that my beautiful wife Kelly is going to be okay without me and to lighten any burden I can for her".

True to his word, step by step, he consulted with a lawyer and other professionals to make sure that all his personal affairs were in order so that upon his passing his wife would not have to deal with any legal complications. Once that was completed, he decided that he would compose his own obituary. He realized how difficult that would be for his wife, in the midst of sorrow and grief. As he wrote, he expressed his feelings about his illness, his childhood, his career and his family. In the midst of it all, he was at peace. Kelly said later "Morris was able to endure the last 16 months (following the diagnosis) with strength, courage, happiness and grace because of his faith in God. He kept a positive attitude even in the worst of times, and said he would be okay either way, because of his trust in Jesus. Morris always had faith but he fully relied upon it following his diagnosis. He wasn't afraid and took comfort in knowing that he knew where he was going and that God was with him."

Many people who spent time with him during his final days, testify that he truly was at peace. In the quietness of their own home, in the early hours of May 17, 2017, Morris simply slipped away to be with his Saviour. His wife, Kelly, as always, was at his side.

At the service of celebration, it was evident that Morris had impacted many lives. Among the capacity crowd of visitors were dozens of fellow Correctional Officers and workers who stood together in tribute to a caring and compassionate individual.

In preparing to die, Morris chose to 'live' each day to the fullest and to 'live' eternally. His loving wife Kelly, who did everything possible for Morris reflects upon that journey. "He truly was my miracle and my gift from God. I am sad every day to be without him, but I remember where Morris is and that takes the 'sting out of my tears'. This is not a tragedy; this is a triumph".

I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus.
