Mayor Ron Smith of the town of Conception Bay South, was Guest speaker at the Men's Fellowship on Tuesday, April 05,2005. I had the opportunity to ask him a few questions.

Editor: What are some of the immediate challenges

you face, due to the population growth in the town?

Mayor Smith: We're really pleased with the growth of the town of Conception Bay South but obviously with the growth comes some significant challenges as well. With the increased population, we need more money to provide better services, better facilities for the youth, families and seniors.

Editor: How could The Salvation Army best assist the town in meeting these challenges?

Mayor Smith: There are a couple of key issues the Salvation Army could be involved with the town, geared to two different groups of people.

1. The school population. The local Corps has already begun a pilot project by providing a school breakfast program at St. George's school. Children coming to school with no breakfast are consequently affected in their work. Maybe this successful breakfast program could be expanded to other schools.

2. The other concern is our senior citizens. They need assistance. Some are living alone and some may not have any family support. So, if we can partner with the local church in assisting our seniors, the whole community would benefit greatly.

Editor: Does the Town Council have anything planned for this summer for the seniors and for the youth?

Mayor Smith: Through our Recreational Department, the town will have a number of events and activities planned. Bus tours have been well attended and enjoyed by all. So future trips are planned to various locations within the region. A number of festivals will be incorporated with oth-

er special events. For example, the Kelligrews Soiree in July, recreational activities, concerts, and games are all in the plans and geared to our seniors.

We have a strong advisory committee, with representatives from Junior High and Senior High School students. They work with our staff in preparing programs and events for the youth. A successful Easter Camp was held this year. In July, summer camps begin.

Parents can enroll their children for a week of fun, and special events. Other plans are ongoing throughout the year. For more information, you can contact Conrad Freake, our Program Advisor, or call our town office and they will put you in the right direction.

Rev. Sandra Tilley.

Rev. Sandra Tilley, an Anglican clergy , is serving the parish of St. Marks, St. John's. Sandra was guest speaker at the Women's Ministry on Thursday , April 7, 2005. I had an opportunity to interview her.

Editor: Sometime ago, you went on an overseas mission. Where did you visit and in what capacity did you go?



Rev. Tilley: Yes, I visited Egypt, China, and the Ukraine, in the fall of 2000. I was with the Canadian Bible Society at the time. Four other District Directors went with me as well.

Editor: How did your trip show or challenge you how to be a partner in mission?

Rev. Tilley: It was a life changing experience for me. I met people who lived in sub-standard living conditions. I met street people, and others who were addicted to drugs and alcohol, as well as people in orphanages. I could contribute to them both physically and spiritually to improve the quality of their life. 1. First, by being there, trying to understand why they were in the situation they were in, and learn not to judge them. Financial help can do so much and I could see where our Anglican Development and Relief Fund and The Salvation Army Partners in Mission can actually make a difference.

2. Spiritually. Through funds being made available, we are able to provide Bibles and through the Canadian Bible Society we

could help in the development of spiritual lives.

Editor: Has your experience changed your ideas about underprivileged countries and their people?

Rev. Tilley: Yes. The experience

changed my attitude and understanding about underprivileged people. I went to "Garbage Village", near Cairo, Egypt, which is a community of about 20,000 and that is exactly what it is. People live with the garbage, finding what they can, using what can be used and recycling other things. Yet, 95% are Christians.

I also visited a warehouse where volunteers came daily to serve supper. They lived in such conditions yet:

1. I saw such inner peace and joy on their faces.

2. A little girl's gift of a lovely hair clip changed my life forever. I met her and a group of street children. All they owned was what they wore. She took one of these clips (half of what she owned) and gave it to me as a gift. I will treasure it forever.

Editor: What are some practical things we could do locally to help our fellow-man?

Rev Tilley: Practical things we can do to show support would be to start, as individuals and a church, to give off the top of what we have—give 10% of what we receive. This will help people physically, emotionally and spiritually.

Also, it helps to give through our own church structure, so that there is a lot less overhead, and our gifts can go further.

But there are also needs right in our communities. In our churches there are people with needs, the sick, the lonely, and many who need support.

Editor: I understand that you personally raised funds for overseas missions in a couple of unique ways.

Rev. Tilley: Yes, while I worked with the Canadian Bible Society, I raised funds for street chil-

dren in the Ukraine. It was March, 2001 and to celebrate my 50th. Birthday, I decided to walk 50 Kms., visiting significant places in my life time. As I walked I invited others to join me, and then at the end of the evening, family, friends and co-workers met at my home for tea and birthday cake. Instead of

gifts, I encouraged people to make donations. I received \$3500.00

In June, 2002, five friends, my husband and I left Cupids by kayak and three days later (99 kms) arrived at St. Philips. I raised \$8500.00 through sponsors for street children in South America.

Editor: In a sentence or two, would you give us some words of encouragement?

Rev. Tilley: We must remember not to judge the size of a gift and never to underestimate what good it will do. Give freely and cheerfully and let God bless our gifts. We sometimes may feel we don't have much to give but remember the little gift with the hair buckle. It changed my life forever.

The program is divided into 4 Phases...

101 Commitment to Membership

Deals with Church mission and vision; Core Values; The Salvation Army and introduction to the Old and New Testaments.

201 Commitment to Maturity

Deals with personal spiritual development and key components of a believer's faith.

301 Commitment to Ministry

Each participant will do their SHAPE profile (Includes...Spiritual gifts; heart passions; abilities; personality; and experiences). It will be determined how to be best used in ministry.

401 Commitment to Mission

Deals with elements of worship and the local church as a part of the broader Christian community.

Each phase is sequential and builds on the prior. Presently, we have approx. 20 members in the Phase 101. That phase will be completed in June 2005. In September 2005, the participants who finished Phase 101 will start Phase 201. Also, 20 new participants will start Phase 101.

I believe it will be one of the means of revolutionizing the church as people receive discipline through this program.

School Breakfast Program

This program is now operating in the St. George's School. Our corps is providing a breakfast to about 160 pupils. We have 48 volunteers helping us. They serve one breakfast a week.

Community Care Ministry

About 10 volunteers visit 2 nursing homes a month. Also, there are some members who are visiting private homes in the area as well.

Red Shield

Last year 96 volunteers canvassed the area and collected \$8,225.27. We need extra people again this year and if you would like to help, please get in touch with the corps office or Zita Butler.

Christmas Cheer Kettles

84 people volunteered 284—2 hour shifts and brought in over \$22,000 to be spent in the CBS area.
