God's Man On The Mountain



In Long Pond there lives a man who is a great storyteller, Lon Baird. Lon and his wife, Sylvia are now retired but keep very busy. He does not have a college education, but he certainly has a wealth of knowledge.

In his earlier years, he was a religious man, but as he said, "He was a sinner in need of a Saviour".

Just days before his 65th. birthday, he received the best gift in the world. That gift was Jesus who

became his personal Saviour. His grandson, Jason gave him some video tapes, *A Visual Portrayal of the Life of Christ.* One tape told of Jesus going up the mountain to pray alone. Lon was inspired. He decided that he too would

begin his day with a walk up Blackhill mountain just behind his home. Since 1997, Lon has daily made this pilgrimage, regardless of the weather.

Part way up, he makes a stop and has a prayer. Further on, he arrives at the rugged cross which he has erected and kneels. He begins with the Lord's Prayer. Then he slowly looks around to the valley below, and as objects come into view, he prays specifically for those travelling in the cars, in a plane flying overhead or those out sailing, and especially people at work or out walking. He then prays for his family and the community.

Finally, looking north, south, east and west, he asks God's blessing upon these people as well. He mentions the sick and the shut-in.

Blackhill mountain has become a special place for Lon; a place to meditate and a place to enjoy God's creation. He thanks God for the birds, the trees, the sky, the beauty all around him. He enjoys going to the mountain and finds there a real sense of God's peace and presence. Truly we could say, that Lon is God's man on the mountain.

On one occasion, as he finished praying he opened his eyes and saw a large bull moose close by looking straight at him. He looked around for a tree to climb, but the moose turned and walked away, almost as if he should not interrupt the sacred moment.

In July, one Wednesday morning, 12 people from the CBS Corps, including the Corps Officers, Majors Lyndon and Lisa Hale and Lon and Sylvia met on the mountain for prayer. It was a real time of blessing as we sang, shared Scripture, prayed for our officers, young people, our corps (church) and the community. God's presence was truly felt. God bless you, Lon. *Matthew 14:23 he (Jesus) went up into a mountain apart to pray: and when the evening was come, he was there alone. Major*

Dad was a carpenter by trade and helped to build the Salvation Army Citadel in Long Pond in 1959, along with other men from the church. Prior to this new church, all services were held in an old school. In those days, the men of the church handled all building

and repair projects. Another citadel was completed in 1986, which was renamed The Salvation Army Citadel, "Conception Bay South Corps."

In 1996 my parents moved into a new house. At the front entrance Dad placed a carved sign that read "MARANATHA." This prompted many passers-by to question him about its meaning. He was happy to inform them it meant, "Jesus is coming."

Dad always considered himself a common man, with no connection to anyone famous or of Royal descent. However, he often said to people, "I can introduce you to the King of Kings."

In his early 40's Dad became very interested in Bible prophesy. It became his passion. He studied the subject daily, reading the Bible and many other books on the subject. He also listened to evangelists and other preachers who shared the same passion for prophesy. Dad began to draw maps on rolls of brown packaging paper picturing major prophetic events and time lines prophesied in the Bible. He figured people would understand it better if they could see it drawn out. He also began teaching Bible Prophesy in an Adult Sunday School Class and a Bible Study Class because so many people were interested and were always asking him questions about it. For many, they had not heard anything like it before.

In church when he would testify he would always quote scripture from the "prophesy" books, especially Daniel and Revelations. Then he would ask, "How are you in your soul? Have you got your ticket in your pocket, meaning, do you have the assurance that you will go to Heaven when you die?" He would describe what Heaven was like and ask if they wanted to be part of it. If so, all one had to do was repeat the "sinner's prayer": "God be merciful to me a sinner. I believe Christ died for me and that His precious blood will cleanse me from my sins. By faith I now receive the Lord Jesus Christ into my heart as Lord and Saviour, trusting Him for the salvation of my soul." Then he would say, "That is your ticket into the Pearly Gates."

when the Lord will come and take me home to live with Him on high."

Today at age 81 Dad and Mom are living in a Personal Care home. His memory is not as good as it used to be; however, he has not forgotten God. He still has a testimony, which he relates whenever given the opportunity. "He still has his ticket in his pocket for his trip to Heaven."
