Conception Bay South Corps With Heart to God and Hand to Man

The Salvation Army has always been known for its motto "Heart to God and Hand to Man". Commissioner Andrew Miller has described our ministry as "The Army is like an airplane with a wing of evangelism and a wing of community services". Both are necessary in order to operate well.

In the CBS area, there are many avenues of service provided and



supported by members of the local congregation. Take a look at

some of them:

1. At St. Georges's Elementary School, Zita Butler coordinates a school breakfast program, twice a week. The editor recently spoke with Elizabeth Churchill, school principal, and she was happy to report that the breakfast program has made a tremendous difference in the lives of many children. While this is only the second year of operation, it has already proven to be a very worth-while project.

Children coming to school
without having had breakfast, for whatever reason, are at a disadvantage for
the ability to learn and concentrate ties directly with good nutritional practices.
The general feeling among the teachers is that children can concentrate better and they themselves are responding

well in a positive manner. The specific students who need this service are the ones who are showing significant



improvements.
Ms. Churchill reminds us that charity begins at home and she encourages the community to give generously so that

many more can be helped, especially at Christmas time.

- 2. An Emergency Response Plan has been implemented by the CBS Corps. Ken James is the coordinator, along with 17 other volunteers. The Salvation Army Emergency vehicle has already been used five times to date in the CBS area. Training sessions have been held at Kelligrews Fire Hall with Lieutenant Chad Murphy. He is so grateful for this kind of help. The van is equipped to serve much needed hot beverages and if needed, the firemen are invited to step inside for a welcomed few moments of rest in the event of a prolonged fire.
- **3.** The CBS Paradise Food Bank is also represented by Rose Ivany from our local congregation. Again, this is a much needed service. We were all sorry to hear of the recent passing of Reg Jones who had served as coordinator for the past few years. He will be greatly missed.
- 4. During the coming weeks, members of our Community Care Ministry team will be visiting about 29 nursing homes as well as individuals. They will deliver close to 500 treats (Sunshine Bags) to the residents. Funds gathered from the Christmas Kettles are used to finance these projects for the CBS area. Four kettles will be staffed by volunteers for 15 ½ days requiring 300 shifts. Anyone wishing to help may contact Zita Butler at 834-5418.

Yvonne started attending the Women's Ministry Program a few years ago and it was the beginning of bringing the whole family to the corps.

Tom and Yvonne are so thankful for the support and acceptance from the members of the corps family. They testify that God has been faithful.

Both Michelle and Chris appreciate their friends

Winston Sparkes, a faithful member of the CBS Corps, comes from Rocky Harbour, on the Northern Peninsula. He grew up in a Christian home and was involved in most of the corps activities, such as Sunday School and

Corps Cadets.

Through the years her faith in God and her ability to recognize needs around her has been a strong point. She still has a keen mind and enjoys crocheting and hand-stitching.

Ethel is still able to read her Bible and enjoys watching Christian programs on TV. She has a wonderful faith in God that has carried her through many trials and tribulations. She has never doubted His presence in her life and can tell you many personal stories. She is grateful to God for her long life and counts herself blessed of God.

Their first married appointment was in Carmanville North. Further corps appointments took them to Glovertown, Embree and Campbellton, Newfoundland. 


