## JUST LITTLE THINGS



A t 28 years of age and the mother of two adorable young boys, Charlene (Dawe) Butler found that her life was in conflict. As a young child, she had attended The Salvation Army in CBS

and became involved in almost every available activity, because deep in her heart she loved Jesus and wanted to serve Him.

However, as an older teen, she questioned her faith and ran from the church and all that she believed about her faith in God. She had no desire to return until after her marriage and the arrival of her two boys. She suddenly felt led to bring them to church.

Through a series of events, which Charlene describes as 'little things', she gradually retraced her steps. It all began when she attended a Sunday morning service, and was really blessed as she listened to her mother singing. She began to think about her mother's life and some troubling times she had experienced. Yet, her mother's faith in God never waivered.

Soon after she was diagnosed with Post Partum Depression, even though her baby was now almost two years old. She was prescribed a medication and it helped for a while but a feeling of emptiness lingered with her.

During this time, as she experienced yet another sleepless night, she tuned into the Vision TV channel. She listened to the testimony of a man who said he was challenged to read the Bible. He agreed to do this, simply to impress his girlfriend but reading the Bible changed his life. That truth spoke to Charlene. The next day, one of Charlene's friends came to visit her and before leaving, reminded her of a Scripture verse. It was 2 Timothy 3:16 "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness". She was assured that the answer to every question was found in God's Word. From that moment, she began to search the Scriptures and was amazed to realize how relevant the Bible was for her daily living.

Soon after, in another Sunday morning service, she was challenged and convicted by the words of the sermon. She felt God speaking to her; urging her to commit her life to Him. Lacking the courage to make that move to the altar, she wept and prayed for guidance. Then she felt the arm of a friend around her and they both stood up and went forward to pray. There she found peace and a real purpose for living. The emptiness was gone and happiness filled her heart.

Charlene testifies to the importance of these little things that led to her conversion; her mother's example, a stranger's testimony, an illness, a Bible verse and a friend's encouragement. God is blessing her life today as she keeps busy caring for her family. She is also involved as a teacher with the Pioneer Program for children. "God uses little things and seemingly unexpected people", says Charlene, "to display His power and grace."

## JESUS WAS MISSING



During Christmas, 6 year old Abby Dawe was fascinated with the manger scene outside The Salvation Army church in Conception Bay South. She and her mom often came by to look at it but she was always concerned that there was no Baby Jesus in the manger. She be-

came curious and wanted to attend a church service. Early in January, she finally persuaded her mom and grandmother to come.

A couple of weeks later on January 17<sup>th</sup>, Abby, daughter of Gerald (Jr.) and Bev Dawe, made the most important decision she would ever make. Following Major Wayne Green's sermon, a number of people responded to the invitation by kneeling at the altar. Then quite unexpectedly, Abby said to her mother "I want to go too".

As Abby and her mother knelt to pray, Major Rosemary Green shared with them in prayer and then specifically led Abby to understand the step she was taking in receiving Jesus as her Saviour. At the time she was presented with her very own New Testament (as shown in the photo). How precious to know that Jesus, the Saviour of the world, while missing from the manger scene was now living in the heart of a little child. Abby is one of the youngest people, in a long time, to make that commitment.

According to a recent survey, a number of people were asked at what age they received Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. The results were as follows:

0-4 years of age	1%
4-14 years of age	85%
15-30 years of age	10%
Over 30	4%

It seems obvious that the longer we wait to make that decision, the chances are we might never make it. It is something to think about. Thankfully, Abby has already made the right decision.

## WHERE ARE THEY NOW?



Nothing happens by chance in the life of a believer. God has a plan and a purpose for all things. That was one of the lessons instilled in me through my church from a young child through my teens

and into young adulthood. My Sunday School teachers, Corps Cadet leaders and many others were a great influence in my life.

Along with the values that I was being taught in the Corps it was essential for me that these same values were being reinforced at home. Since my brother and I started attending the Corps before our parents it was vital for our spiritual well-being that the Corps taught us at such a young age. It wasn't long after we started attending the Corps that our parents also started attending and we would worship as a family.

All of the experiences of our lives prepare us for where we are today and our present realities. That is what I see as I look back over my own experiences. Once I was obedient to what God wanted, and gave up on my stubbornness, He has led me and my husband Paul through many experiences in Corps ministry in Hickman's Harbour, Buchan's and New-Wes-Valley, Newfoundland as well as Bridgewater, Nova Scotia.

In 2007 we were transferred to London Ontario to the Centre of Hope, a homeless shelter for men and women, with a vast number of other services for those in need. I will soon be completing 2 years serving as the Executive Director at the London Bethesda Centre, a Centre for pregnant and parenting teens 18 years of age and younger and Paul is the Family Ser-

vices Director/ Spiritual Care director at the Centre of Hope.

Our children, Nathan (14) and Kelsie (12) are enjoying living in London but will always love our visits home to Newfoundland. I am assured always that a life submitted to God's purposes is enriched, blessed and a life well spent.
