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Brigadier William R. Stanley—December 11, 1902 - February 6, 1991

y father was born in Long Pond, the son of William Stanley and Mary Ann (Polly) nee Porter. He was one of five children - grew up in Long Pond and became a Salvation Army Officer as a result of his response to God's call upon his life.

My father went to work at a very early age and his first job was boiling the kettle for the men who were picking beach rocks here on the beach in Long Pond. The lives of the children were radically altered when my grandfather was lost in the tragedy of the Southern Cross. 173 lives were lost and the impact upon many families was most extensive and severe. From an early age he accepted the responsibility of supporting his mother and other members of the family.

There is no doubt in my mind that these early informative years, with these struggles, left a very marked impression on him. Not only was he frugal, but very sensitive and aware of the needs of the less fortunate.

His ministry as a Salvation Army Officer was not only the preaching of the Gospel for the salvation of his fellow man, but also a very sensitive response to human need whenever and wherever it was identified.

In one of the communities where we lived the headline of his farewell read, "Poor man's friend leaves town".

For my sister Beverly and I, it was always something of a challenge to distinguish the difference between the demands of the "father" and the Corps Officer. Many of his expectations of us as children were realized because of this distinction eluding us. I write this with the utmost of respect.

The daily routine, even to the meal hours, were predicated by the Corps schedule. This was not a disadvantage and we were assured of arriving at various events together.

My father never drove a car during his ministry, although he did own one for about four weeks. He either walked, traveled by public transit, or prevailed upon someone for transportation. This was not a disadvantage, for even in the city he knew hundreds of people by their first name because of his pedestrian encounters. It's my understanding that in the years of retirement, here at the Corps, there were those persons who frequently provided transportation to and from Corps events. For him, I say "Thank You".

In conclusion let me also express the thanks of Mona and myself, our children and grandchildren to the people of CBS who welcomed them home, visited them frequently,

shared in his physical labor, and listened with interest and attention when he conversed, and when he shared his testimony in meetings at The Salvation Army in "Long Pond".

Having had opportunity while writing this account I conclude with one of his expressions, perhaps some of you may remember him saying, "and the thought came to me".
