In the midst of a busy afternoon, the little boy accidently had a serious mishap, requiring an immediate visit to the emergency unit.

Amid the crying and frantic attempts of the sister to keep the wound covered, the distraught mother maneuvered her way through the busy traffic.

She soon learned the wound would require stitches.

The 7 year old daughter, who had remained amazingly calm, must have sensed the anguish and concern. In a calm reassuring voice, she reached out to the mother with these words "Mother, it's going to be okay. He's going to be fine."

And in fact, in a little while he was fine.

Yes, as so often happens, a little child leads. We need to pay attention!

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On April 22, 2011, I arrived in the little town of Upala, in beautiful Costa Rica, and began the most amazing experience of my life.

Along with 24 other workers involved with Operation Christmas Child, a division of Samaritan's

Purse, we were involved in 7 distribution adventures in 6 days.

Local Church leaders usually made the necessary arrangements and when we arrived at these very remote villages, we were always met by very

excited children.

Upala is the second poorest region in the country and this is evidenced in lack of education and medical aid and dysfunctional families are prevalent. Many children are expected to drop out of school by grades 4, 5 and 6 to work on the farms.

In 2010, 8.4 million shoeboxes were collected world-wide, with just over 740,000 from Canada. For the past three years, Newfoundland and Labrador has collected the highest number of boxes per capita.

At most of our distribution sites, we were given opportunity to interact with the children by singing and playing simple games. However the main purpose of the shoebox ministry is to share the love of Jesus. When the children receive their boxes, they also receive a Bible story book, in their own language, called "The Greatest Gift". At each distribution event, a short presentation is made and the children are given an opportunity to accept Jesus into their hearts. They are then given another opportunity to participate in a 12 week discipleship program, conducted by local church leaders. We were privileged to attend a 'Graduation' ceremony during our visit.

At each distribution site, the children were organized into different age groups, and patiently sat in rows. It was very moving to watch the children with their hands folded reverently in prayer; their eyes closed just waiting to open their treasures.(Picture at lower right)

Individually, we were asked to prepare a shoebox to personally deliver to some specific child. I shared mine with 5 year old Kertin (shown in the picture). She was in awe at receiving so much.

The shoebox is not the greatest gift. The message about God's love is what matters most. However, the little shoebox you pack is the opportunity to share the gospel with a little child. I am so thankful for the blessings I received from this ministry trip to Costa Rica. I pray that



God will touch your hearts as we will soon prepare for another collection. Thank you to all who have helped in previous years. God bless you.

Shoeboxes may be picked up at the church on October 9th and the Ingathering will take place on Sunday November 13, 2011. Thank you for your interest and support.


