

Happy Easter!

I will never forget the experience as long as I live. Dot (Dorothy) was a dear saint in our Corps who had terminal cancer. By God's grace, she lived with it, struggled with it, and fought it as best she could. Finally, the medical science team looked at her and her dear husband and told them that there was nothing

else they could do. The day came when Dot had deteriorated to the point physically that Palliative Care had to be called. Since Barb and I knew the day and hour, we went to her home as she made her journey through her front door for the last time.

We were met by her husband Ches, a gracious and kind man, and ushered into the bedroom where Dot was awaiting the ambulance. She lay there with a deep look of serenity on her face and with her ever present smile.

Dot looked up at us and reached out her hand and thanked us for coming. I asked her how she was feeling and what she was thinking now that she was moving to Palliative care. The words she spoke which are etched on my memory;

"Well Major, there has been a song running through my mind all morning.". I began to flick through the possibilities – songs such as 'I'm in His hands what ere the future holds', or 'He hideth my soul in the cleft of the rock', but her response totally took us by surprise. She went on;

'No more we tremble at the grave; For He who died our souls to save Will raise our bodies too. What though this earthly house shall fail, The Savior's power will yet prevail And build it up anew.' He lives, He lives, I know that my Redeemer lives

Barb and I were deeply moved to say the least. We also were very encouraged in our faith. Interesting enough, Dot spent a few weeks in Palliative Care, and never once did we hear her complain. Instead, she cheered every person who walked into the room and gave a testimony of strong faith. On the day of her death, she completed her earthly testimony by simply slipping peacefully away into the arms of Jesus attended by her loving husband and other family members.

I once heard an atheist Doctor say that the thing that moved him the most was the peaceful manner in which Christians died as opposed to those with no faith. Well, there is good reason for that Doctor – the reason is that because of the death and resurrection of Christ, we know that our Redeemer lives and what was it He said? 'Because I live, you shall live also.'

"I was only a child, but I vividly remember a beautiful Saturday afternoon in September, 1961. My friends and I had been invited to attend Singing Company practice, and during this practice time, the Corps Officer and his wife

stopped and explained to us the way of salvation. As we sang "O come to my heart Lord Jesus, there is room in my heart for Thee", all of us accepted Jesus into our hearts. Did we fully understand all that had happened? Maybe not, but we knew enough to realize that we were changed that day. How fitting that the song we were practising to sing was "Jesus wants me for a sunbeam...I'll be a sunbeam for Him".

Has it been a perfect journey since then? I wish I could say 'yes'. Looking back, I have known mountain top experiences, and I have felt God's presence and known His healing touch on my body. Ah! But there have also been times of difficulty and disappointments. It was then that I proved God's promise in Deuteronomy 33:27 "The eternal God is your refuge and underneath are the everlasting arms." I thank Him for all the things He has kept me from and despite my failings, He has been faithful to me. I'm thankful for the wonderful Young People's Sergeant Major, the Corps Cadet Guardian and faithful Sunday School teachers who encouraged me in my younger days, and gave me a solid foundation on which to build my faith.

This journey of faith has led me in various paths, one of which was to my husband of 38 years. With his support, I actively supported our home Corps in Arnold's Cove, leading our brass band for over 30 year. I also served as Junior Soldier Sergeant and supported the Home League. For I know, whate'er befall me, Jesus doeth all things well." I trust God to guide me every step of my way".

Grace Williams and the Queen Elizabeth Pioneers recently won the Provincial (16 and under) Volleyball Championship.




