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A man with a heart for God.

By some estimation my father would not be considered a very successful man. He left school with a grade 4 education; couldn't carry a tune in a bucket; couldn't play a musical instrument; had no professional or vocational training; worked for not much better than minimum wages most of his life providing for a wife and eleven children. He never owned a new vehicle until almost retirement age. He never traveled farther than 100 miles from home until very late in life and lived a modest lifestyle in the same house that he built, for 50 years. May not sound like a very impressive resume. But by my measure he was one of the most successful men I have ever known.

He and my mother saw to it that we were raised to have a love for God, an appreciation for all the blessings we enjoy and a respect for those around us. He taught us the value of hard work and the importance of doing well in whatever we did. I don't ever recall a time when I felt in need or unloved. We were loved and encouraged and every child was special in his/her own way. Dad was proud of his children and we were all proud to call him father.

Despite all the disadvantages he dealt with, it never showed in the way he lived his life. He never complained or made excuses for his circumstances; rather, we all knew that he trusted God to provide for him and the family. But that didn't excuse him from hard work. In fact for many years in order to provide for the family he worked at the Sanatorium TB Hospital in the daytime and worked evening and weekends as a carpenter. I remember him often jokingly saying that the reason he had to work so hard for a living was due to the fact he was born on a Saturday : "... Saturday's child works hard for his living...".

God was honored in our home. My father saw to it that Sundays were revered and all the children were in church (three times a day) – even if it meant we all had to pile in the back of his 1959 Studebaker truck to get there. Grace was always said at meals. Perhaps my most vivid evidence of his faith was the memory of seeing him and Mom kneeling in prayer at bedtime. Now that I am a husband and father myself, I have a deeper appreciation for the struggles he endured. In 1963, my mother at 42, was diagnosed with TB, as brother Ken was born. She and 2 of her children, spent months at the Sanatorium. Their oldest son, Cyril Jr., lost his life through drowning at age 25. In 1971 my father and 3 children were involved in a serious cartrain accident that left Dad in a body cast for 12 months. But through it all there was never a hint of complaint or anger. His faith always saw him through. Even in his last days when his suffering was obvious, his concern was more for the family and those providing his care.

The love and generosity of my mother and father extended well beyond the family. Our home seemed to have a revolving door – people coming for meals or spending a night or two. Many Christmas Day meals were packaged up and delivered to the most needy in our neighbour-hood. Many neighbours and friends depended on my father for a ride to church or medical appointments! In retirement many neighbor children knew they could knock on his door and ask for a popsicle, ice cream or candy any time of the day. In fact, every week while grocery shopping, special treats were purchased specifically for that purpose. All done without fanfare or without the expectation of anything in return.

A successful life? Perhaps not in the estimation of the world. But in terms of one that I aspire to emulate, a resounding YES! Grateful for his great example, I am a better husband, father and grandfather and I strive to be a positive influence to those around me.

Home Schooling Project Display




