Christmas really is about a gift, a special gift; Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Have you received that gift?



And soon, we were singing Jingle Bells, progressively louder and louder 'until Santa could hear' and he came into the room jumping and yelling Merry Christmas, ringing what looked an awful lot like the same bell we used at the school every day. 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Testimony—Michelle Hynes



Michelle Hynes was recently enrolled as a senior soldier at the CBS Corps. This personal commitment was another step on her spiritual journey.

She was raised in the small town of Catalina. At the age of 5, her parents separated and eventually, along with her sister and brother, became part of a blended family which included 7 children. As a child, Michelle and her sister attended church regularly and sang in the choir. Considering the change in their family structure, this was a big commitment for two little girls.

At the age of 12, Michelle's family moved to Bonavista, which meant a big adjustment for the children. Church attendance was soon forgotten, until Michelle married and decided to have her children, Adam (now 14) and Bethany (now 12) brought to the church for their christening. That was the only contact for a number of years.

However, just a few years into her marriage, Michelle felt drawn back to God, but did not know where to begin. Her marriage was struggling and she was searching for a church where she could feel at home and find fulfilment for herself and her children. At the same time, she began attending a new church, which had just opened under the administration of a family member. She and her children really enjoyed the fellowship and Michelle realized, for the first time, that she could pray directly to God herself, anytime and anywhere. She was also challenged by the Bible principle of tithing her resources to God.

Even though she was struggling financially, she made a commitment to follow though in this act of worship, trusting God to meet her needs. Shortly after this time, she and her husband separated, and she realized she was on her own, and responsible for the welfare of her 2 children.

However, in the months that followed, God did provide. She had prayed about finding a new affordable home and a secure job, to adequately provide for her family. God answered her prayers in miraculous ways.

In 2008, at the invitation of a dear friend, Michelle attended the Sunday service at The Salvation Army in CBS. She had shared with her friend about finding a home church where she would feel comfortable and accepted. Michelle testifies "thankfully, I found what I was looking for." Since that time, Michelle has become an official member of CBS Corps. Looking very much at ease in her Salvation Army uniform, Michelle sings with the worship team, helps with the youth programs and is a member of the Human Resources Board. Whenever she is needed Michelle is available to lend a helping hand.

She testifies that her struggles have made her stronger and she says "I will continue my journey with the Lord and I know He will continue to bless me and my family."
