In View Of God's Mercy? Gobsmacked!

Romans 12:1

12 Therefore, I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God—this is your true and proper worship.

Have you ever had a gift given you that was so astounding, so amazing that you did not know how to say thank you? I am talking about that moment when someone shocks you with an act of extreme kindness and generosity and you are overwhelmed with an inexpressible gratitude. Your heart is full, and your mind begins a rapid search for something to say that will convey your feelings, but you know, anything you say will fall far short. Even if you knew the 1,025,109 words of the English language, no combination of them could adequately articulate the gratitude you felt.

That is how I feel when I think of Jesus and His cross. 'Thank you' just doesn't cut it for me. Carl Boberg wrote the famous words in his beloved hymn,

"And when I think, that God, His Son not sparing, Sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in; That on the Cross, my burden gladly bearing, He bled and died to take away my sin."

Me too Carl! I scarce can take it in. In view of God's mercy, I am gobsmacked! Not familiar with the word gobsmacked? It means 'flabbergasted, astounded, speechless, overawed'. So it is a perfect word to explain why I could not adequately give expression with any of the million plus words of the English language. When I think of Jesus on 'His' cross and know that it should have been 'my' cross, it leaves me – well it leaves me – gobsmacked. Such love and mercy for me leaves me speechless.

So, fortunately for me, it is not a speech that the Lord is looking for from me. So that sends me rumbling around my life to see what I can bring Him then. And everything I have seems so wildly inadequate that it is like giving a grain of sand in return for a ton of gold. How shall one so impoverished thank One so generous and gracious? I think Christina Rosetti had the right idea when she wrote;

"What can I give Him, poor as I am? If I were a shepherd, I would bring a lamb; If I were a Wise Man, I would do my part; Yet what can I give Him? give my heart."

We bring him what we have, and who we are. Whether it was a little lad with his lunch, a moral wreck of a lady at the well, an impoverished blind man on the road, the poor widow with her mite or the rich Joseph of Arimathea with his tomb – they all brought one thing to Jesus that was enough. It was their heart.

This Easter as you contemplate the mercy of God, our prayer for you is that you will discover the joy of surrendering your very life to the Lord Jesus Christ. In return He will flood your life with peace and joy of sins forgiven and a future that is secure.
