Ministry Of The Program Committee:


In March 2009, a new "Mission Board Leadership Model" was introduced to the CBS Corps with the establishment of four boards (later called committees). The Program Committee is chaired by the Director of Programs and is responsible for overseeing all matters related to Corps programs. Membership on the Committee include: HL Secretary, CCM Coordinator, Band Master, YPSM, Worship Team Leader, CSM, and Corps Officer.

A major focus for the committee at the onset was to reinstate "Army" programs in the Corps. In 2009, The Salvation Army Youth Discipleship courses (Junior Action, CROSSzone, and CROSStraining) was started along with the establishment of a Junior Brass Band and Singing Company.

The Program Committee is responsible for the planning and organizing of special Corps events throughout the year, of which the main events will be highlighted here.

Partners in Mission Campaign:

Prior to 2009, the average amount of contributions to the 6 week Partners in Mission campaign was \$500. The Program Committee plans a special project each year based on the country being highlighted. Our congregation is made aware of the needs and contributions have continued to rise. In 4 years, the total amount of funds raised during the 6 week campaign is \$13,816! We give God all the praise and glory for how the congregation have responded with financial gifts of love.



Corps Anniversary celebrations "A Glorious Past – A Victorious Future":

In April 2012, we celebrated 104 years with the Divisional Leaders, NL Division, Lieutenant Colonels Wayne and Myra Pritchett. The Program Committee has now started planning for the upcoming 105th Corps Anniversary (April 2013) with special guests Commissioners Max and Lenora Feener.

Rally Day celebrations:

In September 2012, the Program Committee hosted a Rally Day event to kick start Fall programs. Over 50 children registered that day and well over 100 people (families) enjoyed a BBQ dinner together. A great day was had by all.

Christmas celebrations:

This year's theme for the Corps Christmas Celebrations is "Miracle in the Manager". Special events being planned by the Committee include: the Corps Christmas Family Dinner, Breakfast with Santa, and Christmas Carolling. All events for the Corps have been prepared in the Corps Schedule of Events.

Other Initiatives:

The Program Committee assists with the planning of the annual Open Air Summer Ministry and completes an evaluation of the ministry at the end of summer for suggestions for next year.

In March 2012, the Program Committee provided support to the Brass Band Fundraiser. Acknowledgements of donations were made on Mother's Day and Father's Day. On October 20, 2012 a Band concert was held to thank everyone for their generous support. On November 25, 2012 new equipment will be dedicated.

Banding Ministry

CBS Senior Band

The money from the fundraiser combined with a sizable donation from Women's Ministries has allowed the Band to Purchase seven new instruments. In recognition of the donations and as a thank you to the donors the CBS Senior and Junior band held a concert this past October. Also participating in the concert the GLOW singing group. The instruments will be dedicated during the Sunday Morning service on November 25, 2012

The senior band is now preparing for the Christmas Season. The band is participating once again in the CBS Christmas Parade by entering a float. The band will also participate through other means of ministry such as: Christmas Kettle Kick off, Serenading at Dominion, Sobeys, and Pipers. The band will also support corps carolling events and delivery of Sunshine Bags to the Seniors.

CBS Junior Band

The junior band has grown over the past 3 years and is now averaging 20+ members. The program takes place on Monday nights from 7pm-8pm. The age of the group is 7and up. The group has 4 focus areas of training: Theory, Instrumental, Band and spiritual development.

The junior band has had several opportunities to perform publicly in recent months. Several performances include: Men's fellowship Spiritual night and band fundraiser concert.

Currently we are at our full capacity in regards to instruments that we provide to the junior band members. Even with the addition of several instruments that will be passed down from the senior band. The junior band is still in need of second hand instruments.

Ministry To Youth

Nursery

Sunday morning Nursery Program is functioning quite well. We have four teachers who are on a rotation and are currently preparing their own age appropriate curriculum. We do have Scripture Press material for the December quarter and we will evaluate to see if we will continue using it in the future. Currently we are averaging 6 children on a Sunday and parents stay with them and assist the teachers. It would be a great help if we could get 2-3 more volunteers to join our rotation.

Junior Army

The Junior Army Program is also functioning quite well. Currently we have 7 teachers on a rotation as well as having some of our youth who assist. Teachers have been preparing their own lessons, some with the help of the YPSM. In December we will begin with the new curriculum that has been purchased, which will include story and activity sheets.

Currently we are averaging 12 children on a Sunday which is great; however the physical classroom size is not comfortable.

Cross Zones & Cross Training

Unfortunately these programs are currently not functioning. It had been attempted but was felt there was lack of interest from the youth. Those who were able to attend would prefer to stay in church for the entire service. An alternate time may be possible.

Junior Youth Group

This is a new group that has been put in place by Roma Whittle. The ages are 9-12 and will meet on a monthly basis. The hope of this program is to provide another means of outreach ministry for our church and Pioneer children and prepare them for Senior Youth Group when they become of age.

Senior Youth Group

This group meets every other Friday night for a variety of events. We have had a photo scavenger hunt, bowling, city-wide worship and fun night at St. John's West and recently joined with Faith Pentecostal church for a Halloween themed event. Our numbers have been a little lower this year due to some of the youth working or involved in school and community sports teams. One of the aims of the YPSM is to have our youth get involved with other youth groups for various events throughout the year. The YPSM and the Faith Pentecostal Youth Group Leader are excited about bringing our groups together for worship nights as well as fun events.

YC NL 2012 brought out more of our youth (21 youth-young adults) and we were happy to report that one of the newest youth in our Corps gave her heart to the Lord.

Two youth have recently been added to the Youth Committee as it was felt that there was a need for them to be there, to speak on behalf of all the youth.

SNAC (Sunday Night After Church) has also been introduced once again and with this we hope that more youth will start attending our Sunday night church services.

Pioneer Club Ministry

Pioneer Clubs is a Corps to Community outreach program for children. It is a Bible-based, relationshipfocused, fun filled club that seeks to help children/youth follow Christ in every aspect of life. Pioneer Clubs curriculum and ministry are designed to help children grow physically, intellectually, emotionally, socially, and spiritually offering award badges to celebrate learning and achievement. This fall we have registered approximately 10 Skippers (ages 2-3); 20 Scooters (ages 4-5); 20 Voyagers (grades 1-2) 12 Pathfinders (grades 3-4); 15 Trailblazers (grades 5-7). We also have 15 leaders and assistants to help deliver the program and many Corps volunteers and parents who contribute to snack for the children each week. This fall, we are averaging 65-69 in our weekly attendance. This fall we had our opening night on September 25th when we welcomed several new members giving opportunity to connect with a number of new families. One of the interesting characteristics of our club this year is that 3 of the

graduates from the program last year have wanted to return to club this year as participants which attests to the fine teaching and relationship building that has been evident with the leaders. We are also seeing a number of our junior leaders now moving into teaching positions in our efforts to develop leaders. On October 30th Pioneer Clubs sponsored our annual 'Trunk or Treat' night where we filled the parking lot with over 50 cars/trucks with their trunks decorated and full with treats for the nearly 100 children who participated in the fun filled event. This fall as well each Pioneer group filled a Christmas Box for Operation Christmas Child which gave the children an opportunity to give to the less fortunate. Pioneer Clubs will hold our first Awards Sunday on November 18th. Our greatest challenge this year is finding enough appropriate space in our building to adequately accommodate each class. We are also in need of 3 more teachers or assistants.

Cradle Roll Ministry

The Cradle Roll is a program in which parents are encouraged to dedicate their children and enrol them as members of the corps. It includes all children dedicated in the church up to their 5th birthday. This program is a great way to get the family connected to a church and keep them in touch with the corps and future events involving children's programs. Throughout the year children are recognized in special ways on their birthdays and other events.

I make a special effort to hand deliver all birthday cards to the children listed on the Cradle Roll. With their cards I always include a small gift such as a Bible story book, pen, or pencil with a Bible verse on them. The children on the cradle roll that live outside the province are sent their birthday cards and gifts. Since last November I have delivered or sent approximately 43 birthday cards. Hand delivering the cards is one of the most important steps in maintaining contact with the parents and the family.

In October, after many attempts in trying to get the cradle roll families together, the church hosted our first Cradle Roll Luncheon. All children on the Cradle Roll and their families were invited to attend the morning service and then to stay for lunch which was sponsored by the Home League. The response was great, and there were approximately 45 people in attendance. The feedback was very positive and all enjoyed the luncheon and fellowship.

Report of Junior Action and Junior Soldiers Overview of Program*:

Junior Action and Junior Soldiers are Salvation Army discipleship courses designed for children ages 7 to 10. These courses are part of the Youth Discipleship Program – a 10 year series of studies designed to nurture young believers in their faith and their knowledge of The Salvation Army's history and mission.

Junior Action develops an understanding of Salvationism, Army doctrine, and Christian growth through eight units of study over four years (2 units per year). Junior Action classes take place from mid-September to mid-June during the Sunday morning message.

Junior Soldier Preparation Classes (6 week duration) are available for those who choose to be enrolled as junior members of The Salvation Army. These classes take place usually in the Fall of the year

followed up by a special Sunday (usually in January) set aside for Junior Soldier Enrolment/Renewal and Junior Action Commitment Sunday.

Recent History:

September 2009 – Leaders for the Junior Action classes had been confirmed and classes had once again started in the CBS Corps after several years of no Salvation Army programming being offered.

April 25, 2010 – This was a very exciting day at the CBS Corps! The congregation was so excited to see ten (10) new Junior Soldier's being enrolled.

February 6, 2011 – We held a special Junior Soldier Renewal and Junior Action Commitment ceremony.

February 12, 2012 - Once again we were blessed to have two (2) new Junior Soldiers enrolled. It was also a time of Junior Soldier Renewal and Junior Action Commitment.

Current:

We are well underway in our 7th unit of the Junior Action Program. The number of children in attendance for this class ranges from 10 - 14. We alternate each second Sunday with teaching. Junior Soldier Preparation Classes will be starting on Sunday, November 25 with at least 4 children expressing an interest to become Junior Soldier's. Both of us will teach during these six week preparation classes.

Challenges:

There are a couple of challenges that we face with teaching these classes. The Junior Action material is designed to be offered in two age groups: Juniors 1 (ages 7-8) and Juniors 2 (ages 9-10). However, due to limited space and human resources, we combine the two classes in one, which makes for a larger class size. Older children are encouraged to move to the second page of their workbook (Junior 2) where time permits. As well, we do not have a regular set of helpers that can assist with the class (whether with the workbook activity or craft).

The CBS / Paradise Food Bank

The CBS / Paradise Food Bank has been in operation since June 1994, with 12 of our local churches involved, serving all communities from Paradise to Seal Cove.

The Food Bank is operated by a Board which includes a Chairperson, Co-Chair, Treasurer, Secretary and representatives from each Church, including Major Winston Dodge, who represents the local Ministerial Association, on behalf of Major Lorne Pritchett.

The Food Bank meets on the first Wednesday of each month, from 12:00 noon until 1:00 PM.

The Food Bank is supported by an annual financial donation from each Church, from the general public, local businesses, charitable organizations and local schools. Local Churches, schools and other groups mentioned earlier participate in a number of food drives during the year; the most significant one being the one held during Thanksgiving.

During our fiscal year (April 1st, 2011 – March 31st, 2012), the Food Bank distributed 1241 regular hampers, plus 238 Christmas hampers. Lunches were also provided to local schools as needed.

The Christmas season is the busiest time of the year, with the filling and distribution of Christmas hampers. The Annual Christmas Tree Campaign will be officially launched on November 25th, 2012. The deadline for donations will be December 16^{th...} The hampers will be distributed on December 18th. Please note, that this year, our Corps will be covering the total cost of 30 hampers.

Food Bank finances for the year April 1, 2011 to March 31, 2012 are as follows:

Balance March 31, 2012 \$115,866.00

Income 67,359.00

Expenses 69,295.00

Net Loss 1,936.00

Balance 113,930.00

Since March, 2012, the balance has depleted considerably due to the Food Bank having to relocate. The move has been very costly, due to the fact that the rent has increased from \$650.00 per month with everything included (taxes, heat and light) to \$1800.00 per month plus the tax, heat and light are now additional expenses. As you can see, our finances will continue to deplete in the coming years, due to the increased cost of operation.

Many thanks for your support over the years. This is crucial to the success of the operations of the Food Bank.

50 - Plus Fellowship

The 50 – Plus Fellowship has been operating at CBS Corps for a number of years. There is a monthly meeting held from September to May.

A Committee from the group meets regularly and plans for upcoming events. Members are contacted by phone to remind them of monthly meetings.

Our meetings vary from month to month. If there is a special date, such as Thanksgiving, Remembrance Day, Valentine's Day or Easter, the meeting may be geared to that topic. For the past few years, as a fundraiser for the Youth Corps, the 50 – Plus Group has sponsored a Pancake breakfast for our March meeting. Sometimes, we feature a luncheon with soup and refreshments, and then have a guest speaker. We have also featured an afternoon fun time with table games.

Often we invite guest speakers, to share with us on timely and age related topics, such as healthy eating, Senior resources, mental health and other topics of interest.

A 'trip around the Bay' is usually planned for the fall or the spring. This includes a pleasant bus ride, with a stop at some local restaurant for lunch. As time permits, the group will visit historical sites or places of interest.

We have also visited the Anglican Church Cathedral in St. John's and had lunch at their facility. We toured The Rooms, The GEO Centre and enjoyed a tractor ride at Lester's Farm, following a delicious 'Jiggs Dinner', featuring their fresh home grown vegetables.

The group has also catered to a couple of other 50 Plus groups, as part of their planned tours to St. John's. The Carbonear group and Park Street Fellowship from Windsor have shared these events.

For a number of years now, we have sponsored a New Year's Eve Fellowship. We begin with a hot meal, a time of entertainment, and finish with a time of reflection in the sanctuary, as we welcome in the New Year.

At a suitable time, we celebrate with a 50 Plus weekend. Usually, a Saturday evening dinner is planned and a guest speaker is invited to share in the Sunday services. The 50 Plus members also participate.

An offering is usually received at our monthly meeting and often donations are made to worthwhile projects. On outings, the members themselves look after any meal expenses and entrance fees.

The group is pleased that a number of our members are from other local Church congregations and their presence is very much appreciated. Our average attendance is usually between 35 - 40. However, if there is a special event, many more have joined us.

The 50 – Plus group is a vibrant addition to the rich fellowship at CBS Corps and if there are others from our congregation who are not attending right now, we extend a warm welcome to you to come and join us.

Ministry To Women

Home League Report

The Home League remains a very vital group in the Corps. The year has comprised of many exciting programs weekly, which have had a good attendance. There have been many opportunities for ministry throughout this year. Some highlights of the year are as follows.

In October of 2011 & 2012 they hosted a Ministry to Women Week where the ladies were involved in visitation of shut- ins, Bible Study, Bowling and full participation in the Ministry to Women Sunday conducted by Lieut. – Col. Myra Pritchett(2011) and Major Judy Mayo (2012).

In November, 2012 the Home League had their annual Fall Sale. It was a very successful venture with \$5017.92 being the proceeds raised.

On February 8th the Home League along with the Over Fifty Group hosted a Valentines Dinner, which was well attended and very much enjoyed by all who attended.

On February 15th the Home League had a White Elephant Sale and raised over \$200.00 for the renovations to the Sound Room.

On March 1st the Home League aided the Corps in hosting The World Day of Prayer. They provided the lunch for the evening, which added to the ecumenical fellowship of the evening.

On May 9th the Home League sponsored a Women's Banquet, which was a very lovely evening of fellowship and was attended by quite a variety of ladies from within and outside the corps.

There were 16 ladies who attended Women's Camp at Camp Starrigan.

The Home League opened for the fall on September 12, 2012 with a Pot-Luck Dinner and had as their special guest Gloria Guy.

On October 17th the ladies had their first annual bon-fire, which was greatly enjoyed by all.

Throughout the year the Home League had two 'craft evenings', which was open to all ladies in the corps and was well attended.

From 2011 to 2012 the Home financially contributed to the corps in the following ways,

- We covered the cost of new counter top in the Corps Kitchen, a stainless steel top for the island in the kitchen as well as new kitchen counter top for the Quarters.
- Gave a donation to the sound room
- A donation of \$2000.00 dollars to purchase a new instrument for the Band

The Home League has also:

- sponsored a child in the sponsorship of a child overseas in the amount of \$ 360.00.
- given donations of \$500.00 to a Salvation Army Territorial Missionary Project and
- \$500.00 to the Divisional Camp, Camp Starrigan.
- Purchased four goats for the Salvation Army's Gifts of Hope Project

The Corps is blessed with a fine group of women in The Home League, under the leadership of Home League Secretary Lydia Penney, who work very hard to bring blessing to the Corps in many forms.

New Creations

This is a small group of ladies who meet bi-weekly at Admiral's Coast retirement Residence. The New Creations group meets for fellowship and ministry through using their creative gifts to make items, which are donated to meet the needs of others.

This year the New Creations group have been:

- Knitting hats for the newborn babies at the Janeway.
- Making dresses for the little children of Africa
- Making baby blankets for the Janeway
- Making baby blankets for an orphanage in Africa

This year they have left the church to do their meetings at the Retirement Home thereby allowing ladies of that residence to have the opportunity of taking part in so many of the worthwhile ventures the group engages in.

Although this group is small in numbers it is a powerful group, which does a tremendous ministry.

Community Care Ministry

Our CCM consists of 25 members, which makes up three groups. There are also thirteen more (retired officers and others) who assist by doing devotionals and supplying musical support when we visit nursing homes. We visit two nursing homes and two retirement homes each month to meet our responsibility for 26 establishments each year.

This year, we held our CCM weekend with Majors Wayne and BettyAnn Pike as our special guests. The weekend consisted of a dinner Saturday evening and special services on Sunday with member participation.

Another meaningful ministry for CCM is the serving of lunch for bereaved families and their guests following funerals.

In October of this year, we were very pleased to have 13 of our members attend Advanced Training sessions conducted by Major Lorraine Davis and seven more attended basic training held here at our Corps.

Our School Breakfast program at St. Georges Elementary continues to be a tremendous delight for us. All of our members participate at least once per month and are supplemented by volunteers from Scotia Bank, Kiwanis Club, and the town of CBS. We are responsible for every Monday and Friday morning from 7:45 to 9:15. We are very, very grateful for those who make this possible and a priority in their schedule.

On December 10,11 we will prepare 600 sunshine bags to deliver to our 3 retirement homes and 23 nursing homes. In addition, we will provide sunshine bags for our Corps shut-ins in CBS, Topsail and Holyrood.

Also this year, we were able to provide dozens of home cooked meals to those who were ill.

The Community Care Ministry continues to be a vibrant one that is well received by those who receive it and a great source of blessing to all our members.

Oh – by the way – we are always looking for new members – and you are welcome!

I am so grateful to our group for their most excellent service and commitment. Thank you from the bottom of my heart and God bless you for caring!

We now make a point of providing a DVD of baby dedications to the parents. We expect to record the annual general meeting this year, and hope to soon provide a highlight reel of the previous 12 months. Many positive comments have been received from parishioners saying how family members who are away enjoy following the services and some folks who have been sick and unable to attend in person have indicated they routinely follow the videos. Since October 2011, our videos have been fully or partially watched over 3,700 times, which is an average of 66 times per week.

Salvation Army Cemetery

We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Elvis Dawe who is the volunteer manager of our Cemetery. There is a tremendous amount of work involved in that task and we are very grateful. Recent work there has brought a great sense of dignity to those who repose there. Elvis and the cemetery committee remain strongly committed to perpetual care, though the cost of providing that is creeping upward every year. Right now, we provide that care for a one time fee of \$1345.00 which includes a concrete vault, and annual grass and grounds maintenance. Because of the fact that the vaults help us to maintain the integrity of the ground allowing us to keep our annual perpetual care costs down, we feel compelled to continue this practice. It should be carefully noted that the upfront charges from the Corps is never levied as at a rate that will allow us to make a profit. The fee structure is designed only to cover our actual costs. Though we do have an a small surplus now, we must maintain that kind of a balance to ensure that we can continue the pay the costs of perpetual care and be ready for other needs as they become apparent. The surplus mainly comes from our annual cemetery offerings and other small collections we channel to that account.

Bible Study

Bible study is a deeper look into scripture. This function is critical to Christian growth and development. We offer two such opportunities;

Every Thursday morning, Lt. Colonel Ralph Stanley teaches an excellent bible study at the Citadel. There is regular attendance by a good number of people and more are welcome.
