B renda Brown grew up in Grand Bank, NL, the youngest of 12 children. She remembers the challenges and difficulties they faced in trying to properly feed and clothe such a large family. Yet, even in the midst of these trials, she recalls the Christian influence of her mother, and the fact that they attended church every Sunday.

In her late teens, she married Brian and they had four children. However, after thirty years together, they separated and

later divorced. A few years later, he passed away.

Brenda decided then to move to London, ON, to make a new beginning. After a while, she met Gary and eventually they married. Life seemed good. However, in 2012, her life was shattered again. On Christmas Eve, her husband ended his life. She was devastated. She lost all hope and lived in a fog for many days. Her children lovingly supported her through this valley experience but she felt angry with God for allowing such pain in her life.

Yet, in the midst of the pain, she sensed that God was speaking to her and carrying her through this difficult time. By now, she had returned to Newfoundland and tried to put her life back together. She felt lost and all alone. She knew she had strayed from God for a number of years and always felt that there was something missing in her life. She experienced terrible nightmares, thinking that she would die before making things right with God.

Brenda admits that she had begun to go down a wrong path. Instead of choosing God, she tried to ignore Him. She spent her weekends partying with her friends. Then quite unexpectedly, her friend, Anne invited her to attend The Salvation Army in CBS. She came up with many different excuses, because she knew God was calling her back. She knew that if she went, she would have to make a decision. One excuse was the fact that she would not be able to kneel at the altar, because of a knee injury. But God was in control.

She eventually came to church and to her great surprise, Major Lorne Pritchett, the Corps Officer, included these words in his final invitation to come to pray. He said "If you can't kneel, ask for forgiveness, right where you are".

That's all Brenda needed to hear. She cried out to God and received His wonderful peace and joy. A great burden was lifted from her heart and as she said "it felt like I was coming home. I am so thankful that God did not give up on me. My faith grows stronger each day and I love Him and trust Him with my whole life".

Since then Brenda has been enrolled as a soldier and enjoys attending Bible studies, Sunday services and many other ministries. She is so thankful for the support of her children, her 7 grandchildren and her loving husband Bob. "She came to realize that the God of the mountain is the same God in the valley."

The Debt I Could Not Pay



I went into the garage with dread in my heart. The transmission had gone in my car and I had to get it repaired. Now the moment of truth had come and it was time to pick up the car. I walked slowly to the counter and Louie handed me a bill for \$500.00 I never had \$5.00 let alone \$500.00. I began to speak with what seemed to me to be a very small voice, `` Louie, can you wait `til I get my income tax back and....``. Louie`s big hand covered mine and he said, ``Lieutenant, you are not looking at the sheet. Look again.``. I did, and suddenly my eyes fell on the phrase, paid in full. "How Louie?" I said, ``Who...?". Louie just looked at me with his kind face and said, "It's a secret." What a feeling of both humility and joy I experienced in that

moment some 40 years ago. I can still feel that deep emotion, as I write about it tonight, these four decades later. **Paid in full. Wow!**

Of course, you will not be surprised to know that I am thinking of another debt much more substantial than that one. It was my massive debt of sin that I brought to Jesus Christ as a teenager. And we sing a chorus that tells what happened when I repented;

He paid a debt He did not owe, I owed a debt I could not pay, I needed someone to wash my sins away. And now I sing a brand new song, 'Amazing grace!' Christ Jesus paid the debt that I could never pay.

S ince Danielle was only a few weeks old, she has been faithfully brought to The Salvation Army by her Aunt Roxanne. While she cannot remember the exact date when she surrendered her life to Jesus, she knew she always loved Him and was assured that Jesus loved her.

As a young teenager, she participated in many youth activities and today, she is a leader with the Youth Group and the Pioneer Club and she also helps with the "Alpha Teen" ministry, "Ready to Serve" and "Crosszones".

As a teenager, she was often challenged in her chosen life style, because many of her friends did not share her interest in attending church and living a Christian life. She also experienced 'bullying' in her struggle to maintain a more healthy weight. Often, she felt alone and wondered where God was. However, a little plaque she read at a local retail store gave her the answer. It said **"if God brought you to it, He**


